ABOUT CREATIVE SKILLS WEEK 2026

THE DIFFERENCE THAT MAKES THE DIFFERENCE

Creative Skills Week 2026 (CSW2026) is bringing together Europe's CCSI, policymakers, educators, and industry leaders in Brussels at a time when democracy, technological sovereignty, and social cohesion are under pressure to ask: how can we harness and target the transformative power of creative skills for wider societal challenges?

At the centre of CSW2026 is the concept of creative confidence – the capacity to turn creative thinking into action, to bring together forms of expertise conventionally kept apart. This enables individuals and organisations to thrive on collaboration and inclusivity, prototype new models of thinking and action, and develop innovative approaches to familiar challenges. By embedding creative skills into professional development strategies, we can ensure that organisations have the confidence to tackle challenges, experiment, and thrive in an era of rapid change.

While these skills are deeply rooted in cultural practice, their relevance extends far beyond the CCSI. Within the sector, they already drive innovation, shape narratives, and generate new forms of collaboration across disciplines and borders.

Across the wider economy and society, they increasingly contribute to innovation and problem-solving across sectors – from education and digital governance to health systems, human resources, and data-driven organisations.

CSW2026 moves beyond internal sector dialogue to build strategic alliances across policy and practice domains. Through high-level debates, case studies, and cross-sector showcases, the event demonstrates how creative skills operate in practice and why they represent a different perspective, one that reframes challenges, connects ecosystems, and shapes Europe's capacity to act.

This edition also marks a key milestone for the [CYANOTYPES project](#), co-organiser of CSW2026, featuring a [showcase of its pilots](#) – real-life implementations of the [CYANOTYPES Framework](#) – alongside the project's policy recommendations.

Creative Skills Week 2026 is co-organised by [EIT Culture and Creativity](#), [CYANOTYPES](#) and [Creative Futures Academy](#), in collaboration with the [Creative Pact for Skills](#), [CREDEX](#) and the [GreenCCircle project](#).

The event is kindly co-hosted by [ICHEC Brussels Management School](#) and [LUCA School of Arts](#), and is curated by [ELIA](#). It is also recognised as an [Associated Event](#) of the Irish Presidency of the Council of the European Union 2026.

PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

Across three days, this year's programme invites you to explore how creative skills and creative agency can help you and your networks adapt to change, solve problems, and create new opportunities for innovation, sustainability, competitiveness, and resilience.

Day 1:

WHY CREATIVE SKILLS MATTER

At LUCA School of Arts, sessions will explore creative confidence as a driver of innovation, competitiveness, societal resilience, and Europe's capacity to navigate uncertainty. The programme will open with an immersive, interactive CYANOTYPES, Creative Agency Clinic, followed by high-level policy dialogues and networking activities.

Day 2:

HOW CREATIVE SKILLS BECOME SYSTEMS

Taking place across two venues, the second day will explore in greater depth how creative agency is translated into practice. The programme includes thematic sessions delving into the development of local ecosystem partnerships, eco-sustainability transformation, cultural entrepreneurship, AI, and implementation models for learning.

WHAT MUST CHANGE

On the final day at ICHEC Brussels Management School, sessions will explore value frameworks, policy directions, and investment approaches needed to strengthen stakeholder collaboration, lifelong learning, and long-term systemic change.

From Narrative to Action: Enabling Sustainable Transformation

How can the Cultural and Creative Sectors contribute to the green transition beyond awareness raising?

Hosted by [GreenCCircle](#) and the [Creative Pact for Skills – Green Skills Working Group](#), this session explores sustainability transformation through skills development, experimentation, ecosystem-building, and regenerative approaches to creative practice.

From Narrative to Action: Enabling Sustainable Transformation presents the project's integrated approach to advancing the green transition in the Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries (CCSI). It showcases the combined use of the GreenCCircle [Academy](#), [Hub](#), and [Living Labs](#) as interconnected tools that support skills development, experimentation, and organisational change across diverse European contexts.

The session focuses on how these instruments have been applied in practice to address sustainability challenges, close skills gaps, and foster new business and collaboration models. Through storytelling, case studies, and practitioner experiences, it highlights concrete transformation processes enabled by the GreenCCircle Academy, Hub, and Living Labs, making the project's impact tangible beyond its outputs.

A key component of the session is the development and discussion of policy recommendations for green skills and the CCSI, drawing on project findings to inform more effective, practice-based and adaptive policy approaches. Framed as an interactive space for dialogue, the session brings together practitioners, policymakers, and stakeholders to translate hands-on experience into actionable insights and to identify enabling conditions for sustainable innovation. It positions creative competences as key drivers of resilience, adaptation, and long-term value creation within evolving cultural and economic ecosystems.

Regenerative Rural Futures through Culture and Creativity

How can skills partnerships support rural development, and why are culture and creativity critical to regenerative and place-based approaches?
